A Journey of the Heart | Pr. John Keller

A simple form of prayer rarely used is imaginative meditation. It is a spiritual exercise based on Jesus' promise in Matthew 28:20, "Lo, I am with you always, even to the close of the ages." The method has helped me enter into a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior. It involves taking imaginary trip to a favorite peace-filled place. Many people (especially during a Minnesota winter) might choose a tropical beach with warm breezes and rhythmic surf. Or a beautiful garden that is under a brilliant blue sky and filled with fragrant blooms. I choose the Cowlitz Ridge near Mt. Rainier.

I hiked the ridge once, over forty years ago. The week before I left for my freshman year of college, my friend Marv and I decided on one last hike together. We picked a three-day trip along the Wonderland trail which circles Mt. Rainier. At first we climbed steep switchbacks up out of a dark forested river canyon. As we near the top of the ridge we stepped out of the shaded forest into brilliant sunshine and a spectacular view of Mt. Rainier. We camped in that meadow for two nights, soaking up the beauty and wonder of that ridge.

Now whenever I want a special time of prayer, I mentally imagine a journey to that same spot. The only difference is that I take the imaginary trip with Jesus as my guide and friend. While we sit together in that mountain meadow, I share with Jesus whatever anxieties, fears or resentments I may be carrying. I also share my gratitude and hopes. For many reasons, I find rest, comfort, strength, hope in visualizing him there with me. As I meditate a deep abiding peace grows up around me. After a time, my thoughts cease and I simply sit with Jesus. I realize that I could imagine Jesus with me in other locations, but that mountain meadow has become a very holy place within my imagination.

You can try this spiritual exercise at home. Find a quiet spot to sit where you can be undisturbed for several minutes. Close your eyes and imagine yourself traveling to your favorite peaceful place. Visualize the place in your mind: the view, the fragrances and the sounds. Make it as real as possible in your mind. Then invite Jesus to join you and visualize his walking up beside you and being with you. Share from your heart whatever joys or sorrows, fears or dreams that you have. Simply be with him as long as you like. When you are ready to leave, say good b, imagine the journey back to your present location, but also carry with you whatever peace or light you may have discovered during the imaginative journey.

I sometimes wonder if I will ever make the hike back to Cowlitz Ridge. I might, but it is not essential to my spiritual life. The essential part remains Jesus who is my guide and source of peace and joy wherever I am.

Maundy Thursday, April 18


- Noon Worship at St. Mark

March is Minnesota FoodShare Month!

Each March, Minnesota FoodShare directs the March Campaign, the largest food drive in the state, and restocks 300 food shelves across Minnesota. It recruits thousands of congregations, companies, schools and civic groups to run local food and fund drives to aid in the effort.

Minnesota FoodShare actively promotes statewide food shelf donations, provides resources for food drive organizers, distributes funds to participating Minnesota food shelves, lobbies lawmakers on the behalf of those who are hungry, and educates the public about hunger in Minnesota.

So, during the month of March, we will be collecting donations of food and money for those in need. The food gathered will be donated to St. Francis Basket, which is our neighborhood's local food shelf. Checks can be made out to St. Luke with a notation of "food drive" in the memo line. Thanks for all of your help!

I noticed the natural world being used to paint a stark picture and really bring to light God's strength and His mercy. I noticed the words of joy and praise in the readings. Hello St. Luke Members,

I'm writing this before things are finalized, but I trust they will be soon. You will have voted to ratify our new constitution, along with approving our Shared Ministry Agreement with St. Mark and our Ministry Site Profile on February 24th. Perhaps that won't happen, but I think it will. Over the past several months of sharing Pr. John with St. Mark, we've realized the benefits this arrangement can bring to us, and some of our fears have been put to rest. That said, some things have needed to change.

The biggest change is that we're moving our worship service to 8:30am beginning Sunday, March 10th and St. Mark's worship service will be at 10am. St. Mark members truly believe they have lost attendance and perhaps members because their worship service moved from 9:30am to 10:30am. That was a big change. Our worship service time didn't change at all. So, this is a compromise and we'll see if it works. Please realize, all of these agreements are fluid. They can be changed, but first they need to stay in place long enough to see if they'll work. We'll revisit worship times, but not for at least 6 months.

I am very excited to move into the call process. You have elected your Call Committee. We were very fortunate to have more nominees than positions (as we did when we called Pr. Dave). The Call Committee's work is very time consuming and will influence the direction of this church for a long time. Whether elected or not, everyone on the ballot deserves recognition for being willing to do that hard work and I am so grateful for the people who were willing to stand up and say, "I can do this." Whether on the committee or not, we will need every one of you to be willing to participate in the call process by meeting our candidate, placing your vote, and then helping that person become adjusted to this new position ... especially since a shared ministry call in an urban environment is new, indeed.

I feel so blessed by all of you. We are doing hard work. But, you step up to volunteer your time and share your collective wisdom. I want to thank the people who worked on the documents who helped get us to this point: Sue Mc Neill, Jackie Brueggemann (from St. Mark), Jo Klein, Laurie Herrmann, Roger & Dianne Diestler, Pr. John and Pr. Joe. They did the heavy lifting to get us to this point. I hope I'm not missing anyone and if I am, please know it's not intentional.

The Bible verse I want to share is this: "A strong wind was blowing and the waters grew rough. When they had rowed three or three and a half miles, they saw Jesus approaching the boat, walking on water; and they were terrified. But, he said to them, 'It is I, don't be afraid.' Then they were willing to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the shore where they were heading," (John 6: 18-21, NIV). I think that even though sometimes these feel like turbulent, stormy times, if we invite Jesus into our boat, we'll be fine. We are his church, put here to do his work. If we listen to him, we'll be OK.
