The Pastor's Perspective.

Easter: An Ancient Celebration of New Life

People often ask me why the date of Easter moves around so much year to year. Christmas comes around every December 25; why is Easter so hard to pin down? The answer is that Easter occurs on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox, which means it can land as early as March 22 or as late as April 25. That's a great piece of liturgical trivia to know, but it also reveals something beautiful about Easter: it's directly connected to the rhythms of the natural world. My friend Susan Palo Cherwien put it this way:

Passover and Pascha [Easter in English] are both related to the word "passage" – a passage from death to life, from winter to spring, from bondage to freedom, from barrenness to newness. This holy day marking the rising of Christ from the grave is the only Christian festival whose date is determined by both the movement of the sun and the movement of the moon, representing those elemental creative energies of day and night, darkness and light.

This year, the Jewish festival of Passover will begin on April 15, the date of the first full moon after the spring equinox, and our celebration of Easter will occur on the following Sunday, April 17. On that day, we will gather to celebrate the mystery at the heart of our faith: Christ's victory over sin and death. It's a day so special we've spent 40 days preparing for it! This year, as we come to Easter, may we be reminded how ancient and sacred this festival day is, and how it connects us to a long history of faithful people.

This year, we'll re-introduce a practice to St. Luke that is also deeply rooted in Christian history: lighting a paschal candle. (Examples below.) This practice traces all the way back to the fifth or sixth century, when Christians began lighting a new wax candle at Easter. The candle is new each year because it is lit with the "new" fire representing the resurrection of Christ, the light of the world. The candle is inscribed with a cross, an *alpha* and *omega* (the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet), and the current year. The candle declares that Christ is present among us now and throughout eternity! As we introduce the candle, we'll say: "Christ, yesterday and today, the beginning and the ending. To Christ belongs all time and all the ages. To Christ belongs glory and dominion, now and forever. Amen."

At Easter, we do not simply recall a one-time event of Christ's death and resurrection. We proclaim that the risen Christ is truly present with us even today. The paschal candle will stand near the altar and be lit every liturgy through the 50 days of Easter, until Pentecost. After that, it is lit for baptisms and funerals, as a reminder of our baptismal connection to Christ's death and resurrection (Romans 6:5-10). I hope this candle will be a powerful reminder for us that the light of Christ can never be extinguished.

Blessings to you as you enter the final days of your Lenten journey, and may the joy of Easter uplift your hearts!
