The Pastor's Perspective

A Heart for Holy Saturday

I have a friend, Mary, who used to say that for decades the grief and loss she'd experienced in her life kept her stuck on Holy Saturday, the day Jesus lay sealed in the tomb. Easter would come around, and she would find that her heart was still in the grave; she just wasn't ready to embrace the joy of resurrection. Eventually, she felt healed enough to experience an Easter spirit, but for many years, she just let it be okay that she was in more of a Holy Saturday place than an Easter place.

I have kept that wisdom with me for many years. The cycles of the church calendar hold space for a wide range of emotional states, from sorrow and contrition to rejoicing and celebration. The gentle wonder of Advent is often a time of expectation and hope. Then Christmas arrives with all its sparkle as we celebrate the Light of the World's arrival at the darkest time of year. Midwinter's Epiphany always seems a little more subtle, with its focus on the ways God is revealed in scripture, through Jesus, and even now in our lives. And then we move through the somber season of Lent, a time for focus and discipline and spiritual reflection. Until at last, the most joy-filled festival of the church year arrives: Easter! ... That is, it arrives if you're ready.

At different times in your life, different seasons of the liturgical rhythms will feel more or less relevant for you. And honestly, it's okay to get stuck in one moment or the other. God can meet you in any of these days. So this year, you might find that the pain of Good Friday and the waiting of Holy Saturday are hard to bear and

you really need to hold most tightly to God's victory over sin and the grave that comes with resurrection. Or, perhaps you feel like my friend, Mary, ready to walk into the darkness and liminality of Good Friday and Holy Saturday, but not quite ready for all that pastel-colored joy that comes on Easter.

I want to write about Holy Saturday for this reason. And for another: we hold worship on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday. So if you'd like to embrace those days, come to worship at St. Luke (March 28, 29, and 31) and hear more about them! But we don't hold a worship service on Holy Saturday. So here are some thoughts for you to keep with you at home.

First, a Holy Saturday scripture reading for you to reflect on:

Joseph of Arimathea took down Jesus' body, wrapped it in a linen cloth, and laid it in a rock-hewn tomb where no one had ever been laid. It was the day of Preparation, and the sabbath was beginning. The women who had come with Jesus from Galilee followed, and they saw the tomb and how his body was laid. Then they returned, and prepared spices and ointments. On the sabbath they rested according to the commandment. (Luke 23:53-56)

And some thoughts on what to do with this day...

Saturday of Holy Week is the in-between day. The waiting day. The silent day. Jesus has died and the tomb is sealed. What do we do with this day?

One thing you can do is wait. That's what Jesus' first-century disciples did. Saturday was the Jewish sabbath, a day of religiously-prescribed rest. The disciples wanted to go back to the tomb, to adorn Jesus' body and begin their mourning rituals. But they were faithful to the sabbath rhythm, and they waited instead. Surely they were in shock from the week's events, unsure of what the future would hold. And this day of waiting held space for that uncertainty.

Jesus' death and resurrection are written about in scripture, but only God knows what happened on the day in between. So Holy Saturday is a day to bring your unanswered questions, to just let your unresolved emotions be what they are. It's a pause in the chaotic action, a liminal moment. It's important for us to leave time for that in the fast pace of Holy Week.

If you do want to mark this day, here are some other ideas that are fitting:

Read or tell stories. From its earliest days, the church kept vigil the night before Easter morning, waiting through the dark of night for the first moment of daybreak on Sunday. This is why so many

churches have sunrise services. Easter vigil services are full of scripture from the whole arc of the Bible, retelling stories like Noah and the flood, Jonah and the whale, and Daniel in the lions' den. What are your favorite Bible stories? Revisit them on the night of Holy Saturday. (Here's a website that has videos for all *twelve* of the appointed Old Testament Easter Vigil readings!)

Remember your baptism. Easter is overflowing with baptismal imagery: forgiveness through Jesus' death on the cross; the gift of new life; the abundance of spring. The early church baptized groups of people at the Saturday vigil, following their preparation throughout Lent. The newly baptized would participate in their first communion on Sunday morning at Easter. Today, dip your fingers in water and mark yourself with the sign of the cross today. Remember you are God's beloved, sealed by the Holy Spirit forever.

Light a new fire. Easter vigils frequently include the symbolism of fire. As the light of Christ dramatically emerges from the tomb on Easter morning, so we bring a new light into our worship space with a new paschal candle. You can capture the feel of this at home. Our family usually has a small bonfire in our yard on Saturday night before Easter, but even a candle will do. If you'd like to make a paschal candle for your home, this is the perfect day to light it for the first time. (Here's a tutorial to follow) Any fire can evoke awareness of God's mighty presence, breaking through the darkness.



March is Minnesota FoodShare Month!

Each March, Minnesota FoodShare directs the March Campaign, the largest food drive in the state, and restocks 300 food shelves across Minnesota. It recruits thousands of congregations, companies, schools and civic groups to run local food and fund drives to aid in the effort.

Minnesota FoodShare actively promotes statewide food shelf donations, provides resources for food drive organizers, distributes funds to participating Minnesota food shelves, lobbies lawmakers on the behalf of those who are hungry, and educates the public about hunger in Minnesota.
