Summer Devotions

Pastor Bristol has written a series of devotions based on the assigned scripture readings for June and July. Each devotion is paired with a suggestion for a simple spiritual practice you can try. You can download the devotions as a PDF on our website (go to "the Word and the Spirit Blog") or pick up a printed copy in the back of the sanctuary. Here's the devotion based on Genesis 12:1-9, which is one of the lectionary readings for June 18.

An Altar to the Lord

When Abram had come to the land of Canaan... he built there an altar to the Lord, who had appeared to him. From there he moved on to the hill country on the east of Bethel, and pitched his tent, and there he built an altar to the Lord. And Abram journeyed on by stages. (Genesis 12:7-9)

When you hear the word "altar," ornate sanctuaries probably come to mind: marble tables and brass candle holders and large decorative crosses. But this story from Genesis about the beginning of Abram's journey comes long before there were any church buildings. Abram (later called Abraham) was a Bronze Age nomad, traveling from place to place, trying to follow the voice of God to find a new home. Along the way, the text says, he built altars.

Likely these altars were nothing more than a stone or a pile of stones, intentionally placed as a reminder of God's guidance and provision throughout the journey of his life. Someone else passing by might not even recognize one of these altars, but to Abram they were a holy reminder of God's presence and care.

ALTAR GUILD Joyce Bluel In her book *An Altar in the World*, Episcopal priest Barbara Brown Taylor describes altars as "ordinary looking places where human beings have met and may continue to meet up with the divine More that they sometimes call God" (p. xix). The place itself could be anywhere: a garden, a church pew, a closet, a park bench, a mountaintop. But it's somewhere where God's presence breaks through and makes itself known, and then such ordinary places are transformed into hallowed places.

Marking those places can help us remember that "earth's crammed with heaven and every common bush is afire with God," as Elizabeth Barrett Browning wrote, "but only he who sees takes off his shoes." Altars are our reminder that it might be time to go barefoot because we might be on holy ground.

In our house, we work to transform our dining room table into an altar. At Advent, we set out a candle wreath to mark the time until the Christ light comes into the world at Christmas. During the Easter season, we bring out a pillar candle marked with a cross to celebrate Christ's victory over death. Sometimes we add flowers or greenery for special occasions. It's a simple thing, lighting special candles at mealtimes, but for us it's an intentional reminder that God is at the heart of our days and the heart of our home.

A spiritual practice to try: Building an altar

Reflect on a place that has felt spiritually significant to you and consider how you might set an altar there. You could use stones, candles, photos, ribbon, or other special objects to mark the holiness of that spot. Any time you see your altar, offer a prayer of thanks for God's presence.

The Saint Paul Area Synod is launching a paid summer internship program for young adults, funded by the Planting Hope Campaign, and Pr. Bristol has the honor of being the program coordinator. For nine weeks starting in mid-June, nine interns will be serving at sites around the synod. Each week, they'll gather as a cohort to reflect on what they're learning and experiencing and to think more deeply about how faith and vocation intersect.

What a joy that two of our 2023 interns are from St. Luke! Congratulations to Ava Herrmann and Victor Landenberger for being selected to be part of the inaugural cohort of synod interns.

Ava will be working with Shobi's Table, a pay-as-you-can food truck ministry that serves lunch at designated spots around the city each week. The meals at Shobi's are creative and nutritious, focusing on from-scratch recipes using local ingredients. Learn more about how Shobi's creates a common table where all can be fed: shobistable.org.

Victor will be working with Rice Street Gardens, a huge community garden program connected to Galilee Lutheran Church in Roseville. 260 gardeners, 70% of whom are immigrants or refugees, manage their own plots, growing food for their families and beautiful flowers. Many of the gardeners are from Nepal and Myanmar, and more than a dozen languages are spoken in the gardens.
