The Pastor's Perspective

Dear Sisters and Brothers, I pray you are doing well.

Welcome to October. This month, we are celebrating Reformation Month and we remember that rooted in the past and growing into the future, the church must always be open to change to live out the love of Christ in an ever-changing world. We are set free every day to do this life-transforming work given to us in baptism.

Luther was a junior faculty member at a new university in small-town Germany, intently studying the Scriptures, "captivated with an extraordinary ardor for understanding Paul in the Epistle to the Romans." In these days, Luther was tormented by the demand for righteousness before God. "I did not love, yes, I hated the righteous God who punishes sinners, and secretly, if not blasphemously, certainly murmuring greatly, I was angry with God." Then, during that struggle with God, the message of the Scriptures became clear, like a long-shut door opening wide. When he realized that a "merciful God justifies us by faith ..." he said, "I felt that I was altogether born again and had entered paradise itself through open gates."

What Luther discovered is the freedom of Christians trusting God's mercy in Christ. As he later wrote, "Faith is God's work in us. It changes us and makes us be born anew of God. This faith is a living, busy, active, mighty thing. It is impossible for it not to be doing good works incessantly. Faith is a living, daring confidence in God's grace, so sure and certain that believers would stake their lives on it a thousand times."

He says, "Here in it (in the gospel), the righteousness of God is revealed from faith to faith, as it is written, 'the just shall live by faith." This verse is taken from the book of Habakkuk in the Old Testament that is cited three times in the New Testament. As Luther would stop short and say, "What does this mean, that there's this righteousness that is by faith, and from faith to faith? What does it mean that the righteous shall live by faith?" Again, it was the verse for the whole exposition of the gospel that Paul sets forth here in the book of Romans. And so, the lights came on for Luther. And he began to understand that what Paul was speaking of here was righteousness that God, in His grace, was made available to those who would receive it passively, not those who would achieve it actively, but that would receive it by faith, and by which a person could be reconciled to a holy and righteous God.

The Latin word for justification used at this time in church history was—and it's the word from which we get the English word justification the Latin word *justificare*. It comes from the Roman judicial system. The term *justificare* is made up of the word *justus*, which is justice or righteousness, and the verb, the infinitive *care*, which means to make. And so, the Latin fathers understood the doctrine of justification is what happens when God, through the sacraments of the church and elsewhere, makes unrighteous people righteous.

But Luther was looking now at the Greek word in the New Testament, not the Latin word. The word *dikaios, dikaiosune*, didn't mean to make righteous, but rather to regard as righteous, <u>count</u> as righteous, and <u>declare</u> us righteous. This was the moment of awakening for Luther. He said, "You mean, here Paul is not talking about the righteousness by which God Himself is righteous, but a righteousness that God gives freely by His grace to people who don't have a righteousness of their own."

Dear Sisters and Brothers, we are the church that shares a living, daring confidence in God's grace. Liberated by our faith, we embrace doing God's work in Christ's name for the life of the world. "The righteous shall live by faith."

Hello St. Luke! I am so honored and excited to be moving through this process with you, and I'm grateful for your prayerful discernment as you take this congregational vote. I wanted to share a little bit more about myself and my ministry so you can get to know me.

I studied theology at the undergraduate level (Loyola University Chicago) and the graduate level (Graduate Theological Union) before entering parish ministry in 2012. I spent five years working in children, youth, and family ministry near Boston, then moved to Chicago for seminary at the Lutheran School of Theology Chicago (LSTC). My internship brought me to Minneapolis in 2019, where I served as the vicar at Mount Olive Lutheran Church in the Powderhorn Park neighborhood.

Since completing my internship, I have been serving in a temporary capacity at Zion Lutheran Church in Buffalo, MN. Zion recently experienced a significant transition in leadership, with all three of its pastors leaving since I arrived, so my role has been wide and varied. I led the Confirmation program, oversaw staffing changes, preached and led worship, and supported congregational care needs.

In addition to my work in congregational ministry, I am a trained Spiritual Director and have experience doing strategic planning and retreat leadership with congregations. In 2020, I completed community organizing training through the Minneapolis Area Synod, and I currently serve as the chair of the synod's EcoFaith Network leadership group. I love to write, and my work has been published by Augsburg Fortress, White Cloud Press, and Duke Divinity School's online magazine "Faith & Leadership."

After I wrap up at Zion at the end of the September, I'll take a few months off as my husband Michael and I start a new chapter of our lives – parenthood! We're expecting our first child, a girl, in October.

Some more personal details about me: I love distance running and cycling, bird watching, reading both fiction and nonfiction, and doing crosswords. I sing and play piano and have been hoping to learn guitar. Thanks to 18 months of online worship, I have gained a new skill during the pandemic: video editing!

I'm praying for your discernment process today, and looking forward to getting to know all of you as the process moves forward.

Dear St. Luke Friends,

Thanks to every one of you for supporting the St. Luke's Farmers' Market this season. After breaking attendance records last season (during the COVID-19 peak), our numbers increased again this season, while still in the midst of the pandemic. This is remarkable.

Because COVID guidelines changed by the time we opened, we no longer needed to restrict the Market to a single entrance, nor did we have to practice social distancing. We began the season requiring masks of all of our vendors and recommending them for our customers. Eventually, masks were recommended, but not required for everyone. We continued to have a handwashing station and hand sanitizer available at the main market entrance because this is considered "best practice" for markets in general. All of this simplified the Market set up a bit, although we still needed 4 volunteers per shift, per week.

I want to thank all of the volunteers who enabled the Market to occur this summer. As Market Co-Managers, Laurie Herrmann and I were there most Saturdays, as was Doug Klein who is our "set up master" and chief customer greeter. Conie Borchardt and Abby Winecke also were consistent volunteers (working more than half of the markets), with Abby serving as our "Substitute Market Co-Manager" when Laurie or I couldn't be there. MANY of you volunteered multiple Saturdays (often 4 or 5 times) and without your willingness to do that, the Market couldn't have happened. We also had two volunteers from St. Mark who served multiple times. At the risk of missing someone (if I did, I'm truly sorry), this is the list of our market volunteers: Jen Fredrickson, Kay Reich, Jo Klein, Doug Klein, Emily Elfritz, Christine Olson, Claudie Melbye, Nancy Redlin, Barb Jensen, Ken McGrew, Don Clark, Joyce Bluel, Carol Hornung, Beth Peterson, Pete Klein, Olivia Peterson, Rob Herrmann, Jill Burchill, Volker and Victor Landenberger, Sue McNeill, Conie Borchardt, and Abby Winecke. ALL OF THIS WORK YIELDED GREAT RESULTS! As of this writing, we've had a record number of attendees. We have retained our past customers and have seen several new faces. We also have FIVE new vendors including Curioso Coffee, Caldera Caramels, SweetiWinks Marshmallows, Papa Bears Jams, and The Hen Collective, which is a group of neighborhood women who sell arts and crafts. In addition, Green Acres Beef returned this season after finding a new processor.

Finally, I want to thank Jo Klein and Becca Ruiz for publicizing the Market on our website and through social media. Becca and some of our vendors also have come up with creative ideas to promote Market attendance. The Market is NOT an individual effort. It takes all of us to make the Market a success each year. THANK YOU SO MUCH!

The Market continues to be my "happy place." This group of people, including our volunteers, customers and vendors, truly has become a community. As we prepare for our next season, I wish you good health, much happiness and hope for an end to this pandemic and better days ahead. Thank you, thank you, thank you! Best, Wendy Bjorklund

We can also pray for our hearts to be open in welcoming our new pastor, new ideas, and renewed energy in our congregation. We have scheduled a Meet and Greet with Bristol and her husband on Oct. 3, after the service. You will soon hear of a "card shower" (more on that soon). Let us be positive and appreciate the uniqueness our pastor will bring to us. I also look forward to Bristol meeting each and every one of you in person at the Meet and Greet, a service, or on Zoom chats that will be scheduled in January and on. We must be sure to wear name tags as often as possible...masks can make it difficult to make a connection. She does have a photo directory (that will be updated in 2022). Hopefully and with prayer, I would like to be maskless at church in 2022 (or sooner).
