The Pastor's Perspective

Discovering and Developing Your Spiritual Gifts

On Sunday, August 27, our second scripture reading came from the book of Romans. Here's a portion of that reading:

I say to everyone among you not to think of yourself more highly than you ought to think, but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned. For as in one body we have many members, and not all the members have the same function, so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us: prophecy, in proportion to faith; ministry, in ministering; the teacher, in teaching; the exhorter, in exhortation; the giver, in generosity; the leader, in diligence; the compassionate, in cheerfulness. (Romans 12:3-8)

Paul wanted every member of the church to understand that they had been uniquely gifted by God to contribute to the whole community of faith. Some people are especially gifted for teaching, Paul wrote, some for ministering, some for encouraging, some for giving, and so on. These gifts are a sign of grace, the blessings of a generous God.

Paul was clear that all gifts are valuable for the good of the whole: none is better than another. It can be easy for us to look at people gifted in ways that we are not and think they offer more to the body of Christ than we do, but scripture tells us otherwise. Our September Worship Volunteers

gifts work together, like different parts of a body, to keep our community healthy and whole.

So what spiritual gifts do *you* bring to the body? Perhaps that question fills you with a sense of worry, that you don't actually have any gifts worth offering. Perhaps it fills you with energy, excitement that your skills are important. Perhaps it fills you with curiosity, wondering what your gifts might be and how you might use them. However you feel about the question of what your gifts are, it's still worth asking. And it's not something you have to navigate alone.

At our October 21 congregational retreat, we'll have a whole morning workshop dedicated to the topic of spiritual gifts. We'll explore the scriptural basis for the idea of giftedness, and each person will take an inventory to help identify their unique spiritual strengths. We'll also have time to consider how the gifts across our community might work together to better serve God and neighbor. We are a constellation of gifts, made up of the many sparkling stars of each person in our congregation!

I took a spiritual gifts inventory over the summer, alongside the synod interns, and I want to share with you some of what I learned. Here are gifts for which I had a high "score," in other words, gifts that I am especially well equipped to offer to the community.

Teaching the faith: this gift reflects an ability to explain the Christian faith and scriptures and help others apply them to the daily lives. A good gift for me to use for preaching, leading Bible study, and teaching Sunday School.

Encouragement: the ability to comfort, motivate, strengthen, affirm, and be present with one another; building others up and instilling in them an awareness of the Holy Spirit's presence. I hope this gift is demonstrated in my pastoral care.

Shepherding: shepherds are those who gather people together, protect them from harm, and draw them close to Jesus. Shepherds are especially equipped for guiding and nurturing people under their care. This is a good gift for pastoring in a congregational context as a leader of a faith community.

Those were my top three gifts. They might seem obvious to you, since I'm a pastor, but I still felt somewhat surprised to see them as my greatest strengths. It did feel affirming to see that those are gifts I use every day in my ministry. But no one is gifted at everything, so I also want to share with you some of the gifts in which I had *lower* "scores."

Discernment: distinguishing false teachings from true teachings. People with this gift can help determine who in the fellowship might be abusing their spiritual gifts. Discernment is a check on others, a radar for integrity and honesty. Although I didn't score highly in this gift, I was glad that two young adults from our congregation did. I told them I was glad they were listening closely to my teaching and watching my leadership: they can help keep me accountable! That's how the gifts work together within community.

Helping: helpers have a strong sense of compassion and are ready to offer tangible support to others, especially in times of

I didn't score highly in this gift either, which reminds me that I should be especially grateful for those in our community who do have this gift and can be leaders in meeting other's physical needs. I might be good at showing up with an encouraging presence, but I'm not as good at showing up with tangible resources.

Generosity: sharing joyfully and passionately what you have and who you are with others; a willingness to give of your time, money, abilities, with open hands and open heart. This doesn't mean I don't have the ability to be generous, but it might mean I need to work at it when it doesn't come naturally for me. Some people are true leaders and example-setters when it comes to generosity: I am confident we have parishioners who will score highly in this gift!

Seeing that these are gifts in which I didn't score very highly is a great reminder for me that I can always be learning from others in these areas, just as they might be learning from me in my strengths. I can look to others who are more gifted in these areas to show me the way.

Discovering your spiritual gifts is only the first step. It opens up a world of learning as you begin to develop and strengthen the gifts you naturally have and consider how you might apply them. For instance, if you score high in discernment, you might consider becoming a member of the church council. If you score high in generosity, you might consider stepping up to design a stewardship campaign. If you score high in helping, you might consider signing up to volunteer with Loaves and Fishes.

I hope you can be with us at the Congregational Retreat on October 21. I look forward to learning about the gifts each of you bring to our community and how we can better support you to utilize them for the sake of the Gospel!
