Preparing for the coming of Christ

The season of Advent begins this year on Sunday, December 1. Advent calls us to prepare for the coming of Christ. Of course, I am talking of the coming of Christ as the little baby Jesus, born and laid in a manger, which we celebrate at Christmas. But the scope of Advent is more far-reaching than that. We are called also to prepare for the coming of Christ *today*, right now, in our time.

We're well accustomed to preparing for Jesus the baby born in Bethlehem. We set up our nativity scenes. We sing carols about angels and donkeys. We hear the story from Luke about how there was "no room at the inn," so familiar many of us could recite it from memory. But preparing for Christ to come in *our* time is a little bit trickier. What might that look like in practice? Let's take some words from our scripture texts for this coming Advent season to guide us.

SERVE OTHERS

May the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all. – 1 Thessalonians 3:12 (read on Advent 1)

The crowds asked John the Baptist, "What then should we do?" In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." – Luke 3:10-11 (read on Advent 3)

Caring for those in need is a wonderful way to observe Advent.

Materials gifts aren't the only need. This is a time of year that is hard for many, so sending a note or making a phone call to someone who is grieving or lonely can be another way to "abound in love," as Thessalonians says, during this season. When you do the work of welcoming those in need, you are doing the work of welcoming Christ. As Thomas Merton wrote, "Christ is born to us today, in order that He may appear to the whole world through us." (from Seasons of Celebration, pg 112)

PRAY ALWAYS

Jesus said, "Be alert at all times, praying that you may have strength..." – Luke 21:36 (read on Advent 1)

Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. – Philippians 4:6 (read on Advent 3)

Alertness is always a theme of Advent. We are called to pay attention to the surprising ways Christ shows up in our lives. One way to create this state of attentiveness is through prayer. Jesus tells us to pray for strength to face difficult times. Paul reminds us to offer both our thanksgiving and our supplications to God constantly. We pray for others, for ourselves, for our world.

Over the next few weeks of Advent, make an extra effort to pray with more intention - whether your prayer is saying to God "thanks," "help," or just "wow." Or even if your prayers have no words at all, they can still be an offering of your attention to God who receives every prayer. If you're someone who uses an Advent calendar, use the daily event of opening a window as a moment to pray. If you're someone who uses an Advent wreath, simply lighting a candle can be your prayer.

Some words from the late priest and writer Edward Hays: "Take time to be aware that in the very midst of our busy preparations for the celebration of Christ's birth in ancient Bethlehem. Christ is reborn in the Bethlehems of our homes and daily lives. Take time, slow down, be still, be awake to the Divine Mystery that looks so common and so ordinary yet is wondrously present." (from A Pilgrim's Almanac, pg. 196)

WORK FOR PEACE

Because of the tender mercy of our God, the dawn from on high shall break upon us... to guide our feet in the way of peace. – Luke 1:78-79 (read on Advent 2)

He shall be great to the ends of the earth. He shall be the one of peace.

– Micah 5:4-5 (read on Advent 4)


During Advent, we hear about God's dream for our world, one in which all people can live in peace. Revisit Mary's Magnificat in Luke 1:46-55, for instance, and notice how it is a blueprint for a world in which justice and peace are available for all. Advent is a season for us to wonder how we might be part of bringing that dream to reality, and to ask God to guide us in that work. Our community, our nation, and our world are all in dire need of peace, and, as the saying goes, "peace begins with me."

Another passage from Edward Hays about being a peacemaker in Advent:

"Advent is the perfect time to clear and prepare the Way. Advent is a winter training camp for those who desire peace. By reflection and prayer, by reading and meditation, we can make our hearts a place where a blessing of peace would desire to abide and where the birth of the Prince of Peace might take place. Daily we can make an Advent examination. Are there any feelings of discrimination toward race, sex, or religion? Is there a lingering resentment, an unforgiven injury living in our hearts? Do we look down upon others of lesser social standing or educational achievement? Are we generous with the gifts that have been given to us, seeing ourselves as their stewards and not their owners? Are we reverent of others, their ideas and needs, and of creation? These and other questions become Advent lights by which we may search the deep, dark corners of our hearts." (from *A Pilgrim's Almanac*, pg. 196)

I hope these three practices – service, prayer, and peacemaking – might be part of your Advent season this year and that they might be an encouragement to your spirit.
