## The Pastor's Perspective

### Daily Bread: Practices of Receiving and Giving

After God rescued the ancient Israelites from slavery in Egypt, they wandered in the wilderness for decades, awaiting the time when they could settle in a new homeland. We've been reading this story from Exodus during our Sunday morning worship in recent weeks. As the people wandered, God provided for them. God provided leadership, to help them discern the way forward. God provided protection, to keep them safe from harm. God provided sustenance, in the form of a strange new food that appeared like seeds on the ground each morning. The Israelites called it "manna," which literally means "What is this?" (See Ex. 16:1-15) God had provided for them in a way they never could have imagined, in a way so new to them they didn't even know what to name it.

There was an interesting catch to the manna, though. The people could only collect enough for each day's needs. They couldn't store it up for later, or leave it on the ground for another day; it would just go bad. Each day's provision was enough for that day and that day alone. The next day they would have to get up and rely on God's provision all over again. When we pray the Lord's Prayer, we ask God to "Give us this day our daily bread," another reminder that we need God's continual provision day by day by day.

Praying each day for God to provide cultivates in us a heart posture of gratitude. All that we have comes from God! When we fear that tomorrow might bring scarcity, we can be reminded that we put our trust in a good and faithful God who will keep showing up for us as each day comes. We are called to steward well the gifts we have today and to trust in God for what we will need tomorrow.

It's not only our receiving that works this way, but also our

giving. There's a reason we talk about financial stewardship every year. Just as our prayer for "daily bread" reminds us that we continually rely on God's provision, our annual stewardship campaign reminds us that we are continually invited into a life of generosity in response to all that God has given us. We don't give once and never think about it again. Generosity is an on-going act of faithfulness, a regular practice of gratitude. God provides for us every day, so we are called to give and share every day – over and over again.

As we enter our fall stewardship campaign this month, I hope you will be able to think about your giving as a regular practice, the way you might think about praying for daily bread or saying a prayer of thankfulness before meals. You might be tempted to think, "I've heard all this before. I already know about stewardship!" But it's worth talking about again because it is part of our vocation as people of faith. You might be tempted to think, "Nothing really changes year to year about my giving. Why are we talking about this again?" But if you pay attention, you might find that God is up to something new in your life, something surprising and mysterious like manna.

Please mark your calendars for Sunday, November 5, when we'll hold our annual meeting after worship and Sunday, November 19, when we'll celebrate during worship the generosity of St. Luke and all the ministry it makes possible.

## Suggested Guidelines:

Fast selling items each year are ethnic foods (lefse, krumkake, stollen, etc.), sweet rolls, coffee cakes, candies (fudge, etc.), sweet breads and yeast breads, jams and jellies, and PIES. Cookies, bars, cakes, muffins and cupcakes also do well.

Please prepackage your bakery donations as follows:

6 cookies per package

4 cupcakes or muffins per package

12 candies per package, cut 1" x 1"

6 rich bars per package, cut 1" x 2"

6 cake bars or sheet cake per package, cut 2" x 2"

All frosted items should be placed in a single layer. If you cannot package your baked good, we'll be glad to do it for

I want to specifically thank this summer's volunteers. As market Co-Managers, Laurie Herrmann and I were there most Saturdays, as was Doug Klein who is our "set up master" and chief customer greeter. **MANY** of you volunteered multiple Saturdays (Kay Reich and Conie Borchardt each volunteered 10+ times) and without your willingness to do so, market couldn't happened.
