

Book Club: Sue McNeill has scheduled a book club meeting to discuss "The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society" by Mary Ann Shaffer and Annie Barrows on <u>Thursday</u>, July 23, at 7:00 p.m. If you'd like to read then discuss books, please read the book and bring it to church. There will be discussion questions and refreshments (of course)! The book is available at the library and is in paperback now. Future meetings and books will be discussed at that time.

Book Description: January 1946: London is emerging from the shadow of the Second World War, and writer Juliet Ashton is looking for her next book subject. Who could imagine that she would find it in a letter from a man she's never met, a native of the island of Guernsey, who has come across her name written inside a book by Charles Lamb.... As Juliet and her new correspondent exchange letters, Juliet is drawn into the world of this man and his friends—and what a wonderfully eccentric world it is. The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society—born as a spur-of-the-moment alibi when its members were discovered breaking curfew by the Germans occupying their island—boasts a charming, funny, deeply human cast of characters, from pig farmers to phrenologists, literature lovers all. Juliet begins a remarkable correspondence with the society's members, learning about their island, their taste in books, and the impact the recent German occupation has had on their lives. Captivated by their stories, she sets sail for Guernsey, and what she finds will change her forever. Written with warmth and humor as a series of letters, this novel is a celebration of the written word in all its guises, and of finding connection in the most surprising ways.

Micro-lending Group

The micro-lending group met on Tuesday, June 9 at church for a delicious meal followed by a time of making some micro-loans to people around the world. We have loaned out a total of approximately \$1,800.00 to 16 different people in 13 different countries around the world. Since beginning, we have received repayment of about \$300.00 from the loans made. We have used the monies received through repayment to make additional loans. We have made loans to a man in Togo, Africa who runs a restaurant, a man in Lebanon who runs a grocery store, a woman in Azerbaijan who raises cattle, a woman in Cambodia who farms, as well as a woman in Tajikistan who sells fruits and vegetables. During our meeting on June 9 we made six loans to people in Central and South America.

With the help of these loans along with their own hard work, people are making better lives for themselves. It is a joy to be part of that. Please join us for the next meeting on <u>Monday</u>, <u>September 28 at 6:30</u>. We meet quarterly, always enjoy a good meal together, and then make some life-giving loans. Come join us!
