Thoughts from Pastor Dave:

"You will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

As most of you know, I was a missionary in Japan for many years and continue to be interested in overseas mission. Like the early Christians in Acts, we in St. Luke are called to mission in the Highland Park area, Minnesota, the U.S. and the world. At the March church council meeting I introduced three ideas for being in mission in the world. The council has agreed to begin exploring these ideas and I would like to share them with you. I want to stress that these are just in the exploratory stages.

- 1. Every year the Japan Evangelical Lutheran Association (JELA, a Lutheran foundation) in cooperation with the Japan Evangelical Lutheran Church sponsors Japanese youth (ages 15-20) to come to the United States for two weeks to take part in a Group Workcamp and do homestays (of about a week) in a U.S. Lutheran church. I would like to invite them to St. Luke for their homestays in the summer of 2009 or 2010. If they came next year they would arrive about July 27, 2009, do five days of homestays here, then go to a workcamp for six days. Upon returning from the workcamp, they would stay for two more nights with St. Luke families, then return to Japan (It would be the same basic schedule and time frame in 2010). Some of these youth may be Christians, some will not be Christians (less than 1% of the people in Japan are Christians). This is a wonderful way for us to participate in world mission right here in our own church. Hopefully, our youth could go with the Japanese youth to the workcamp. Our main task would be to provide homestays for them (about 10 youth). Costs to St. Luke would be minimal (maybe a barbeque?). I will be contacting JELA about the possibilities of St. Luke providing homestays in 2009 or 2010.
- 2. A micro-lending group here at St. Luke. A friend of mine belongs to a micro-lending group at his church. They meet four times a year for dinner, then check an internet site for their lending organization (they use Kiva) to find which people/projects they would like to sponsor. For example, one project was a farmer in Kenya who needed a refrigerator for \$750.00. The group could choose to give some money, for example, \$25.00 towards that loan. When there is a total of \$750.00 from enough people giving towards the loan, the loan would be made to the farmer (Kiva takes care of all of that). He would then have a certain amount of time to pay it back. A person can give as much or as little as they wish, and since it is a loan, it eventually comes back. You can then choose to lend it out again to a new project, or get your money back. What is beautiful about this system is that a little money goes a long way, and it is paid back. It is a wonderful way to help people help themselves and can have a significant impact. If there are enough of you who would like to try this out, we can begin such a group here at St. Luke.
- 3. A trip to the Comprehensive Rural Health Project (CRHP) in Jamkhed, India (www.jamkhed.org) in the fall of 2009 or 2010. I was involved with this project during the time I was in Japan and visited there 6-7 times. I also led three workcamps of Japanese volunteers to CRHP. This trip would be paid for by the individual people participating in the trip. I would pay my own expenses also. There would be no cost to St. Luke. CRHP was begun over thirty years ago by Dr. Raj and Maybelle Arole, two Indian doctors who trained at John Hopkins University Hospital. They were asked to stay at John Hopkins, but felt called by their faith to return to serve the poorest of the poor in India. Their work is absolutely inspiring. When I think of the work, "miraculous" is the word that comes to mind. I have learned in a very concrete way from Dr. Arole that ALL things are possible in and through Christ. Check out their web site. This trip would be for those who wish to go. I simply want to make this possible for anyone who is interested. I will be happy to share information and give a presentation about CRHP for anyone who is interested. Please let me know!

I look forward to hearing your thoughts and questions about any of these three ideas. It is good to be in ministry with you.




President's Blog
